Kant's attack

 "Laziness and cowardice are the reasons why such a large part of mankind gladly remain minors all their lives, long after nature has freed them from external guidance. They [laziness and cowardice] are the reasons why it is so easy for others to set themselves up as guardians. It is so comfortable to be a minor."

Kant's faulty (I claim) assumption

 Energetic and brave people and societies can and should leave their comfortable heteronomous childhood behind, to become truly autonomous.

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- Heteronomy ends late (with death)

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
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 - Autonomy is real, though

- Luke 15: 11-32
- Son takes fortune
 - Son squanders fortune
 - Son is sorry, goes home
 - Father is welcoming
 - Older brother is unhappy





- The psychology of the prodigal son
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 - Reversion to heteronomy ????

- The morality of the prodigal son
 - Are parents supposed to be friends, or authorities?

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 - Are parents supposed to be friends, or authorities?
 - The hard journey to mature autonomy

- The older brother
 - Slavish heteronomy, or bad autonomy?

- The father
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 - "There are no adults"

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 - Nearly endless adolescence

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 - Many people want to escape from freedom

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 - Children need lots of moral support from authorities
 - Adults should develop an autonomous response to authority – make it my own

- Kant's simplistic understanding of the human predicament
 - Bad things happen when people are too free: excessive autonomy creates withdrawal, conformity, and/or a thirst for control

Conclusion

- We are all always children striving to be adults
- The autonomy-heteronomy divide is unhelpful
- We should look for eunomy: good law!
